CHIEF COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

2020 was a year of challenge like we could not have imagined. Girl Guiding in Australia rose to the challenge and demonstrated our commitment to making a difference in the lives of girls and young women. To all in Girl Guiding in Australia - BRAVO, WELL DONE and THANKYOU.

As the new year unfolded, we were shocked and saddened by the devastation from natural disasters, in particular the bushfires that ravaged our beautiful country. It was tragic. You will read in this annual report of our special 'Hands and Hearts' badge, our Wall of Support and our Bushfire Emergency Relief Fund. Thanks to so many who generously opened their hands and hearts to provide support in the impacted communities and who have given financially. Girl Guides Australia was overwhelmed at the support offered especially from our global sisters.

Girl Guides Australia were pleased to be a community partner with T20 World Cricket. How wonderful to join with 300 girls and young women from Girl Guides Victoria on International Women's Day in March when the Melbourne Cricket Ground was filled to capacity for a women's sporting match – the World T20 Cricket Final and how proud we were as Girl Guides that our Australian team won.

Had anyone told us as we revelled in those celebrations that we would soon be changing so much

of how we live we would never have believed them! But all the spheres of our life were impacted by the global pandemic and Girl Guiding was no different.

Restriction on face-to-face activities and imposed lock downs meant some changes to how Guiding could provide a place for girls and young women to belong, where they could continue to discover their potential as leaders of their world and where fun and friendship abound.

Girl Guide Leaders all around Australia took to the challenge and did an AWESOME job. The creativity and resilience shown by Leaders was inspiring. Thank you to each one of them for their efforts to adapt in a changing world as they did their VERY BEST to deliver Girl Guiding. Their amazing ability to think outside the box enabled girls and young women around Australia to continue to experience our great game of Girl Guiding.

Thanks also to the leadership of each State Girl Guide organisation who worked tirelessly from when COVID-19 loomed on our doorsteps. Girl Guides Australia provided support to State Girl Guide Organisations in numerous ways including reduced membership fees and funding access to digital platforms.

The pandemic created a whole new virtual world for us – from Board meetings, State events, Girl Guide TV, Unit meetings with Promise Ceremonies, pet shows, obstacle challenges, yoga, craft, cooking, connecting with Guides in other Units around Australia, campfires, to camps and so much more – all VIRTUAL!

The Girl Guides Australia theme badge for 2020 was Guides Connect - so relevant for a year where connection was so important. It was popular with many of our Guides as while adjusting to the restrictions of the pandemic it was the perfect time for Guides to explore ways to Connect at home, Connect to their community, Connect to Australia and to Connect to their world. I know there was great excitement building as the date approached when Guides around Australia could start to return to meeting together, sharing in outdoor adventures and connect face-to-face.

Whilst we have had many adjustments and challenges in Guiding in Australia, Guiding is a global movement and many of our sister Girl Guides and Girl Scouts around the world have experienced and continue to experience a far greater impact of the pandemic on their everyday lives. Our World Centres remain closed, and many are still unable to meet together. We continue to think of our Girl Guiding and Girl Scouting sisters all around the world.

I was pleased to welcome two new Assistant Chief Commissioners in 2020 with Miranda Cummings, Assistant Chief Commissioner (International) and Micheala Collins, Assistant Chief Commissioner (Young Women). We also welcomed Wendy Kirk, National Coordinator – Youth; Nicola Jones, National Coordinator – Olave; Joy Ord, National Coordinator – International to the national team.

A strength of 2020 for Girl Guides Australia was the establishment of the Girl Guides Australia Young Women's Forum. We are an organisation for girls and young women, and it is important the decision making within the organisation includes perspective from our young women. Micheala Collins chairs the Young Women's Forum which has ten representatives aged between 16 and 30 from our State Girl Guide Organisations. The Young Women's Forum will provide input to GGA Board discussions and be consulted by the GGA Board to support decision making and national Guiding initiatives.

Thank you to all those who contribute to global Girl Guiding and Girl Scouting and share their skills, time and experience with other Member Organisations of WAGGGS. In particular I acknowledge:

Natasha Hendrick who was awarded a Silver Kangaroo in 2020 for her sustained and significant service to global Girl Guiding and Girl Scouting. Natasha completed a six-year term on the WAGGGS Board in 2020 and was awarded a WAGGGS Medal of Service.

- Susan Campbell, Chair of the Olave Baden-Powell Society. Susan was also awarded a WAGGGS Medal of Service for her long-term contribution to WAGGGS.
- Bronwyn Hughes who was appointed as Chair of the Asia Pacific Regional Committee and appointed as a trustee of the WAGGGS Board.

I am privileged to share the leadership of Girl Guides Australia with Janet Torney, Chair and Trish Manten, Chief Executive Officer and I thank them for their continued energy and enthusiasm for Girl Guiding.

Whilst 2020 was definitely challenging, our volunteers and staff across Australia demonstrated their commitment to empower girls and young women to be confident, self-respecting, responsible community members. Guiding would simply not exist without the dedicated Leaders, volunteers, supporters and staff who share a passion for the development of girls within our community.



1930 Lady Baden-Powell proclaimed World Chief Guide

1931 Lord and Lady Baden-Powell visited Australia

1943 Guide International Service(GIS) formed in Australia

1946 World Badge adopted at the World Conference in France

1946 Queen's Guide Award introduced

1947 Lady Baden-Powell visited Australia

1947 Guides in Australia collected and sent ingredients for the Queen's wedding cake

1949 Interstate Guide camp held in Victoria

1951 First international Guide camp held in Australia in NSW

1966 Sangam World Centre opened in Pune, India

1976 Australia celebrated 50 years of Guiding with a Ribbon of Gold across the country

1988 Australian bicentenary Guiding celebrations and special events held in all states, with a special camp (Porepunka) in NSW attended by Guides from around the world

1996 The new Australian Guide Program was introduced

1996 The Olave Program was established

2001 National Convention of Guides Australia took place in Tasmania

2005 The Friendship Train travelled around Australia with Guiding participants from around the world

2007 The name 'Girl Guides Australia' officially adopted

2009 The Australian Prime Minister Kevin Rudd announced 2010 to be designated the Year of the Girl Guide, acknowledging the invaluable contribution of Girl Guides Australia over the past century

2018 Celebrated 60 years of Girl Guide biscuits

2019 Girl Guides Queensland celebrated 100 years

2020 Girl Guiding in Australia pivots to online Guiding to support ongoing girl-led connections during the global pandemic

ABOUT GIRL GUIDES AUSTRALIA

Girl Guides Australia (GGA) is the peak organisation for Girl Guiding in Australia. We bring over 18,000 girls and young women together in Guiding and other activities every year with a focus on girls leading their own journey.

Our mission is to empower girls and young women to become confident, self-respecting and responsible community members.

With nearly four thousand adult members and volunteers across the country, our State Girl Guiding Organisations (SGGOs) deliver Guiding from metropolitan locations through to regional towns. Meeting each week, bringing girls and young women aged 5 to 30 years together to meeting, learn and discover. We make space for girls to enjoy fun, friendship and adventure through Guiding.

As a founding member of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts (WAGGGS) GGA is part of a global movement that brings together more than 10 million members across 152 countries. GGA enables international experiences for Australian girls and women, linking them to their sisters in Guiding all over the world and offering leadership opportunities that inspire them to contribute to creating a better world. As a part of the Asia-Pacific Region of WAGGGS we contribute to regional and global activities and events.

Guiding empowers girls and young women to develop leadership and life skills though self-development,



challenge and adventure. Girl Guides learn by doing.

Every day, we see girls and young women all over Australia taking the skills Guiding builds and applying them to their lives, their families and their communities. Guiding instils in our members a commitment to acting on issues they care about and contributing to the world around them.

THE GIRL GUIDE METHOD FOR GIRLS AND YOUNG WOMEN

As our core capability and the activity that all policies and systems must support, the Girl Guide Method is defined by the World Association of Girl Guide and Girl Scouts as: (Verhoeven, 2014)

- Learning in small groups to support each other, negotiate, make democratic decisions, assert our needs, solve problems together, take the lead
- At the pace and through a pathway that is determined by the girl to respect individuals, make our own choices, learn in the best way for us, value our achievements, collaborate not compete, be confident
- Learning by doing to take on challenges, learn through experience, take risks, make mistakes, get involved, pay attention
- Connecting with others to value others, appreciate diversity, listen, connect, make a difference, develop empathy, communicate
- Connecting with the world to be active citizens, get our hands dirty, enjoy the outdoors, get involved in our community, speak out for change, pay attention to the wider world
- Learning is experiential and connected to others with a goal of making the world a better place.



AUSTRALIAN GUIDE PROGRAM

The Australian Guide Program (AGP) is a non-formal educational program based on shared leadership and decision-making at all ages.

THE FOUR MAIN ELEMENTS OF THE AUSTRALIAN GUIDE PROGRAM ARE:

1 PHYSICAL

2 PEOPLE

3 PRACTICAL

SELF

The program includes a variety of fun activities that focus on self-development in the areas of practical skills, physical development and relationships with people, appropriate to age and interests.

Guides of all ages are involved in decisionmaking, planning, implementing and evaluating their activities.

Within her Unit, the Guide will be a member of a Patrol (4-8 girls), where experiences are shared. Guiding is about being part of a team. Leadership development begins with the youngest Guides and develops as the girls mature.

In 2021, Yasmin was awarded Youth Influencer of the Year by The Martin Luther King Jr Center and also been named as one of the Australian Financial Review's 100 Women of Influence and 40 Under 40 Asian



Australians. The Guides were able to interview Yasmin and assist in the development of the editorial for print. As part of the article a Unit from New South Wales were also able to be part of editorial and were able to share voices to what they wanted from their futures.

The Australian Women's Weekly Christmas special included Girl Guides Australia both in their print edition but also as part of the Channel 10 Christmas TV Special. Guides from across Australia were able to share their ambitions for the future.

NATIONAL OLAVE PROGRAM

The Olave Program is for Australian Girl Guide members aged 18-29 years. The program focuses on the three aspects of community, adventure and self-development.

2020 saw many changes to how Olave Program members participate in Guiding events. The move to online forums facilitated continued connection, meaning the continuation of a vibrant program. The success of these online events means future planning now includes both online and face to face events, to ensure accessibility to opportunities.

2020 HIGHLIGHTS

COMMUNITY Olaves take opportunities to make a positive difference in their communities through volunteering, service and advocacy. This was done by:

- Adapting annual face to face events for an online platform. NSW, ACT and NT moved their annual conference online, and Western Australia took the opportunity to start a biannual Olave Forum
- Reaching out to the wider Guiding community through online events. Olaves in Victoria led and participated in online events and forums engaging with Guides across the state
- Organising online events such as trivia, board games, cooking competitions, landscape painting tutorials, and yoga. These have become very popular and are set to continue
- Undertaking key governance and leadership roles beyond the Olave Program within Girl Guiding in Australia eg. as members of boards, working groups and external forums

ADVENTURE Olaves take opportunities to challenge themselves through new experiences especially in the outdoors and internationally

- Events held for Olave Program members in early 2020 include the Summer Camp in Western Australia, and the state-wide annual Scout-Guide Regatta in Tasmania
- Olave Program members have taken the opportunity to start planning their future overseas trips, road trips in their local areas, and other local and state events

SELF-DEVELOPMENT Olaves take opportunities to develop skills and knowledge to enable them to grow as individuals.

- All Olave Program members engaged with Guiding in a new way through learning how to adapt to and succeed with engagement using online forums and online events. For example, Queensland has successfully increased its member engagement through social media
- 2020 saw an increase in the number of young women taking on the challenge to join the Olave Program committee in their State Girl Guide organisation.

RECOGNITION There are a number of different awards that Olaves may choose to work towards during their time in the Olave Program. These awards provide opportunities to Olaves to challenge themselves in different areas and be recognised for their achievements.

INTERNATIONAL

Girl Guiding and Girl Scouting is global and many from Girl Guiding in Australia are enriched each year through international adventures.

These travel adventures may be to one of the five WAGGGS World Centres – Pax Lodge, Our Chalet, Our Cabana, Sangam and Kusafiri; to WAGGGS conferences and events; or to camps and events hosted by another Member Organisations.

Learning about the world through international Guiding enables learning about others and the diversity of people of our world, fostering not only friendships, but also understanding and tolerance into the future.

Prior to March 2021 groups of Guides and their Leaders travelled to various parts of the world including Pax Lodge, Our Chalet, and Sangam.

Sadly, these international opportunities were severely impacted by the global pandemic. From March all travel adventures were cancelled. This included groups attending the Poland Jamboree, SOAR in Canada, events in Japan and at all World Centres. International exchanges moved to digital platforms.

The World Centres went virtual and Units from around Australia joined in virtual programs. Guide Units connected using various forms of technology with Girl Guides and Girl Scouts in other countries including New Zealand, Pakistan, Japan and South Africa.



A highlight for many was the Global World Centres Campfire in April when more than 3,000 Guiding sisters from around the world joined in campfire fun and friendship. Later in the year Australian Girl Guides shared in the WAGGGS Global International Night which included the release of a special song Share the Light. This song was composed by Guides from around the world, including Australia, with the view to help Girl Guides and Girl Scouts feel more connected to each other and to our Movement for girls and women and it reminds us of our collective power to change the world. Australian Girl Guides were part of the digital global choir of more than 109 people from 20 countries across all WAGGGS Regions.

The WAGGGS World Conference, due to be held in Uganda in July 2020 was also cancelled. The Girl Guides Australia World Conference delegation of Rosemary Derwin, Miranda Cummings, Kate Alcorso, Wendy Kirk and Emily Milton Smith will join representatives from other Member Organisations at a virtual WAGGGS World Conference over five days in July 2021.

Girl Guides Australia were invited to participate in G.I.R.L. 2020, a Girl Scouts USA Global Roundtable. Whilst the event was unable to go ahead, the pre-event Hosting Program was held virtually. The delegation from each Member Organisation was paired with a Girl

Scouts USA branch. Our delegation worked with Girl Scouts who live in China, Japan and Germany who are members of the Girl Scouts USA Overseas Branch to Take Action on Gender Equality.

In a time of restrictions on face-to-face Guiding and lockdowns, the annual digital event Jamboree on the Air and Jamboree on the Internet (JOTA/JOTI) provided girls and young women the opportunity to connect with Scouts and Guides all around the world.

We look forward to when international travel again allows Australian Guides to share experiences with their sister Girl Guides and Girl Scouts.

LEADER DEVELOPMENT

Girl Guides Australia acknowledge the vastness of our country, the geographical barriers and the individual demands on the time of our volunteers so it is important to look for ways to make training more accessible to more leaders and provide more flexibility.


